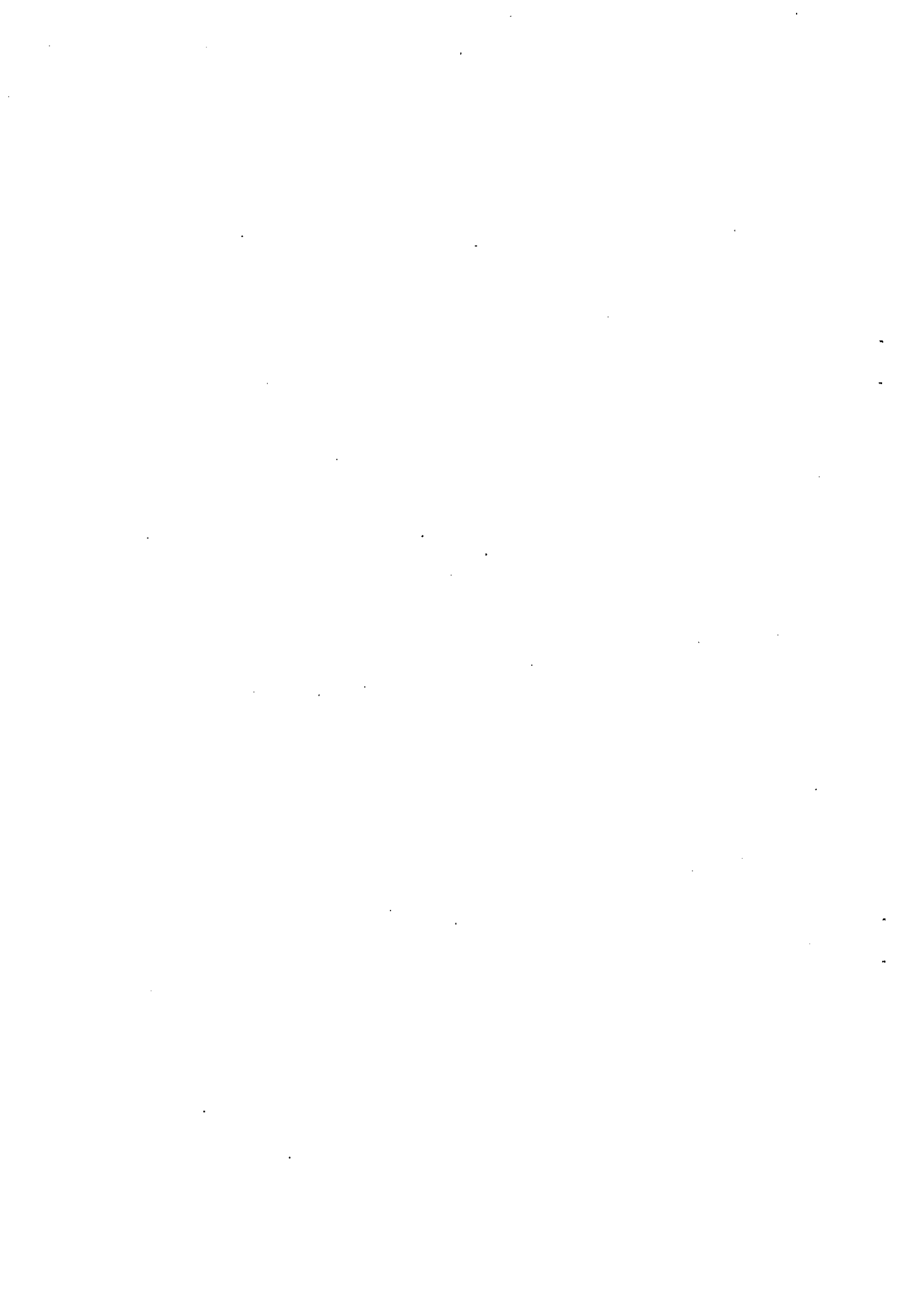

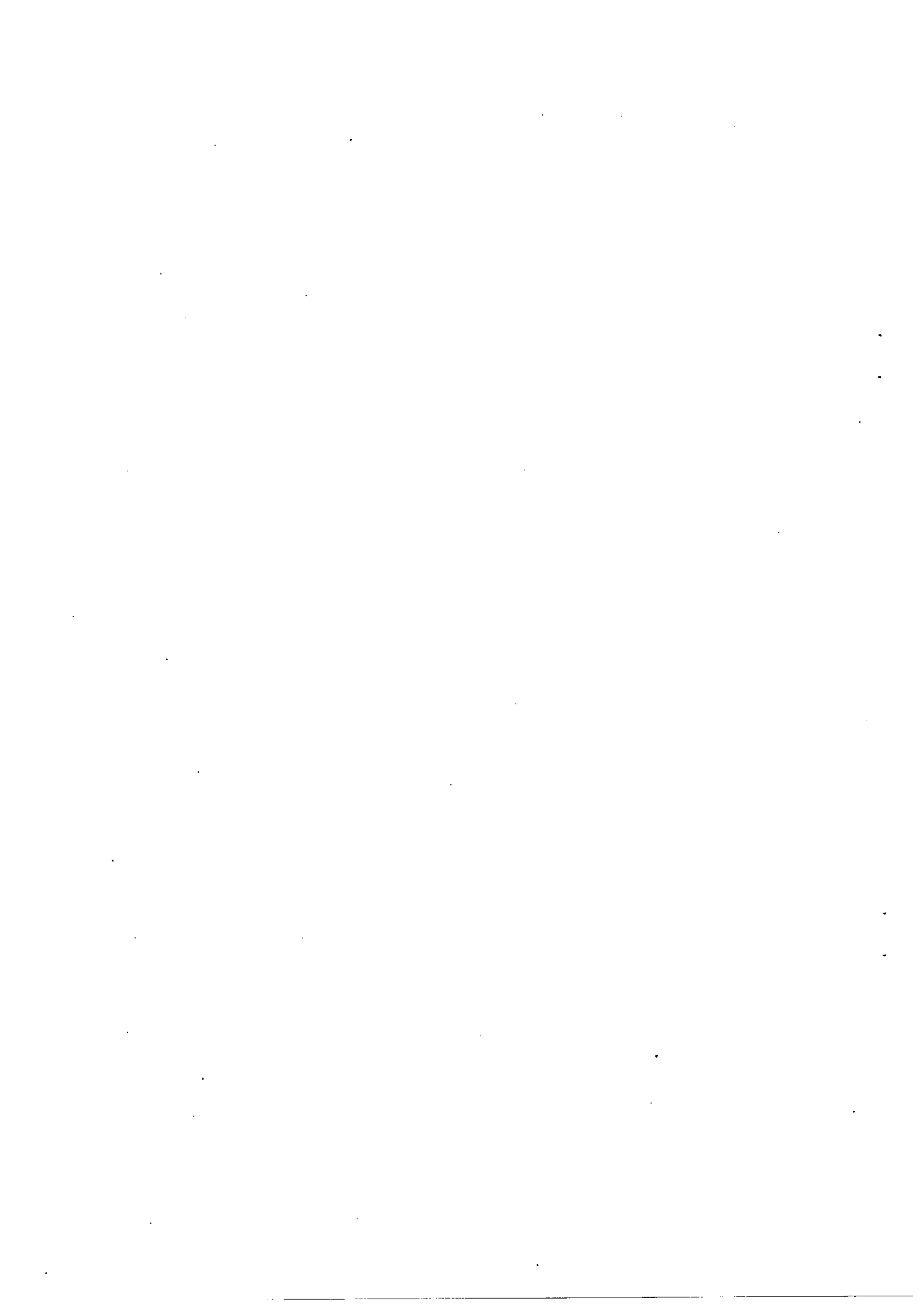

Dear Judge Lorenzen,

With this letter we would like to let you know that Taiwan government is organizing an international review conference in the week of 16-20 January 2017 in Taiwan. The international review conference will gather eminent international experts (hereinafter referred to as the Review Committee) to engage in reviewing Taiwan's second ICCPR and ICESCR-State Reports. We are using this opportunity to invite you to participate to this Review Committee.

Taiwan government has completed its second periodic state reports on January 8, 2016. The Chinese and English version of the second periodic state reports are scheduled to be published in the end of April 2016.

The review procedure will start off in mid-May 2016 by submitting the state reports to the Review Committee and the parallel reports will be submitted to the Review Committee by the end of June 2016 as well.

After the list of issues identified by the Review Committee by the end of August 2016, Taiwan government will provide written replies to the list of issues by the end of October and NGO will also provide a written response to the list of issues by the mid-November 2016.

The Review Committee will be expected to meet in person with representatives from the Government and NGOs as well for the preparation of the concluding observations and recommendations in the week of 16-20 January 2017 in Taipei, Taiwan.

As you might be aware, Taiwan (the Republic of China) withdrew from the UN in 1971, and has not been able to benefit from the protection of human rights by UN treaties and mechanisms since then.

In 2009, Taiwan's parliament enacted "the Act to Implement the ICCPR and ICESCR," (Implementation Act) and the two covenants were granted domestic legal status. Since then, similar acts have been enacted for CEDAW, CRC, and CRPD. According to Article 6 of the Implementation Act, "The government should set up a human rights reports system in accordance with the two Covenants." Taiwan government prepared the Initial Reports, and invited 10 international experts, mostly with considerable UN experience, to review the state reports for the two Covenants in February 2013. After reviewing the

Initial Reports the panel produced 81 points concluding observations and recommendations which can be downloaded here.

Thank you so much for your positive reply.

The review process of the ICCPR and ICESCR states reports here in Taiwan is very much similar to that of the UN mechanism.

Two panels of international independent experts will work together to review all aspects of the ICESCR and ICCPR state reports (May 2016) along with parallel reports from civil society (June 2016) and provide the Taiwanese government with the list of issues (August-September 2016) by correspondence. The 10 experts of the two panels will be invited to Taipei, Taiwan and have constructive dialogues with the government delegation and NGO representatives as well from 16 through 18 January 2017 and finalize the concluding observations and recommendations on the 20th.

As you may have noticed from the Concluding Observations and Recommendations of the 2013 review attached with my previous email, indigenous issues were prominently highlighted, indicating the challenges facing indigenous communities in Taiwan. I cannot emphasize enough the significance of the input you will bring. Your comments are highly anticipated and would definitely contribute to the local indigenous movement.

Really look forward to meeting you in Taiwan.

I am writing on behalf of the "Advisory Board to the Ministry of Justice" of Taiwan to enquire the possibility of your being a member of the Committee of Independent International Experts to review Taiwan's second ICCPR and ICESCR State Reports. The review procedure will start off in mid-May 2016 by submitting the state reports to the Review Committee, which will be expected to meet in person with representative from the Government and NGOs as well for the preparation of the concluding observations and recommendations in the week of 16-20 January 2017 (tentatively scheduled) in Taipei, Taiwan.

As you might be aware, Taiwan (the Republic of China) withdrew from the UN in 1971, and has not been able to benefit from the protection of human rights by UN treaties and mechanisms since then.

In 2009, Taiwan's parliament enacted "the Act to Implement the ICCPR and ICESCR," (Implementation Act) and the two covenants were granted domestic legal status. Since then, similar acts have been enacted for CEDAW, CRC, and CRPD. According to Article 6 of the Implementation Act, "The government should set up a human rights reports system in accordance with the two Covenants." Taiwan government prepared the Initial Reports, and invited 10 international experts, mostly with considerable UN experience, to review the state reports for the two Covenants in February 2013. The Concluding Observations and Recommendations were officially presented to the government, which is attached for your reference.

As the government is preparing for the second review, an advisory board has been set up, composed of four members of the "Presidential Office Human Rights Consultative Committee" and four NGO representatives, to oversee the Ministry of Justice which acts as the secretariat of the Review. As far as we can tell, 6 of the 10 experts who came for the first review will be able to return for the second review. The advisory board for the Review is just starting to solicit the support of experts who could bring

the most impact on Taiwan's society to facilitate its efforts to promote and protect human rights. Your name immediately came to me, and was approved by the advisory board.

I was designated as the first contact with you, and an official invitation will later be issued upon your positive response. The indigenous rights groups here in Taiwan really look forward to your joining the review panels and believe your expertise will bring insights into ways of resolving the long history of conflicts between the Han and indigenous cultures.

Your consideration would be very much appreciated.

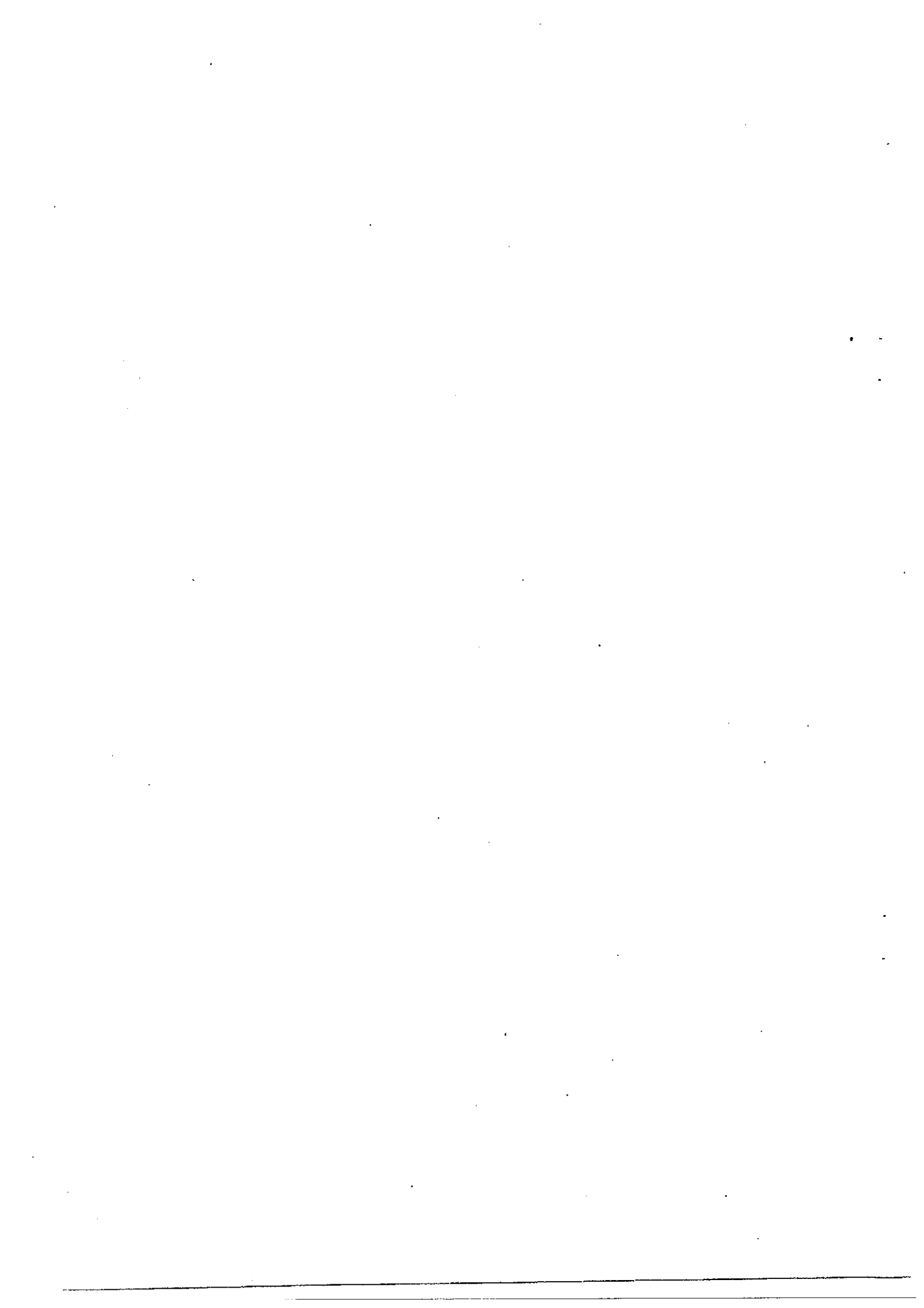

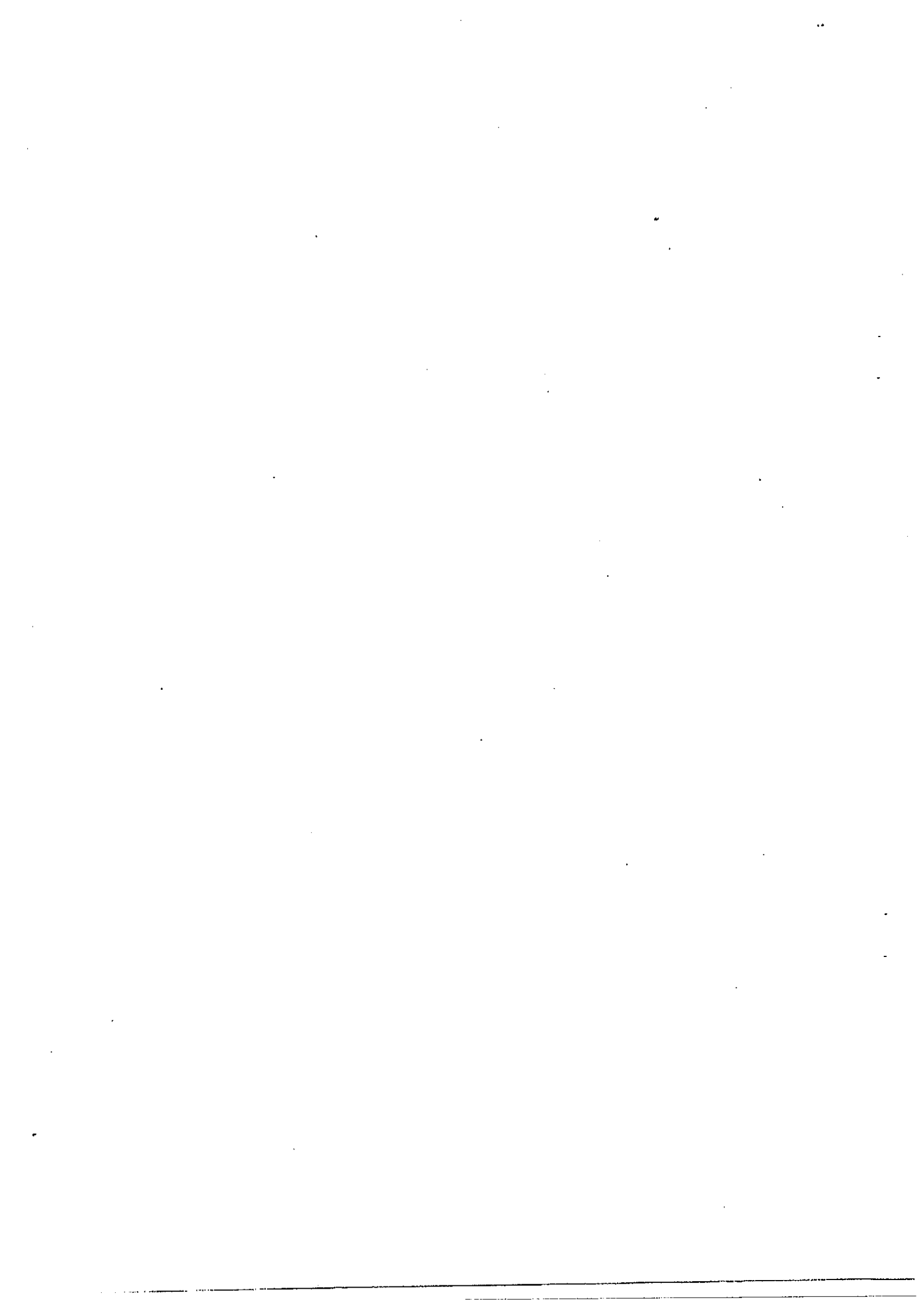

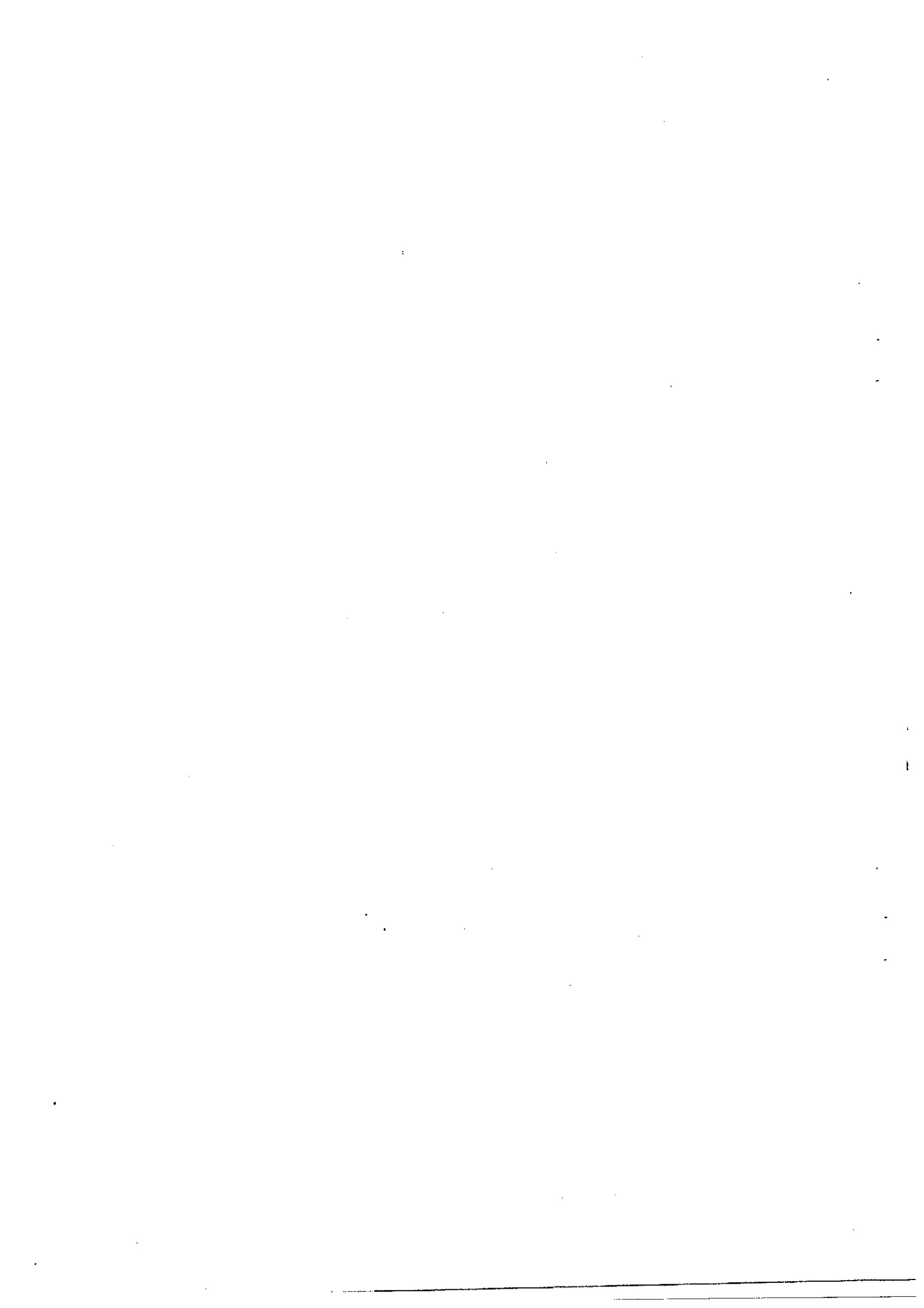
